Oberlin College will host the 26th Annual Conference of the Association for Japanese Literary Studies on February 16 & 17, 2018. The theme of this year's conference will be "Violence, Justice, & Honor in Japan's Literary Cultures."

Violence—war and violence elsewhere in society--is rarely separated from Japan's literary and cultural histories. Violence has also proved polysemic, highly mutable in its occurrences, meanings, and effects, at the intersection of literature and social justice, or claims to honor. Violent manifestations in literature and other cultural fields may discredit—or sanction--forms of bodily, ecological, and psychological harm. The aim of this interdisciplinary conference is to re-examine our ethical, imaginative, political, and creative engagements with violence in expressive cultures.
