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# Plans for the 29<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting

Greetings. I hope that you are managing to maintain good health and spirits during these challenging times. Over the course of this spring and summer, Ann Sherif and I met with the organizers of the upcoming AJLS conferences (at UCLA, Rutgers, and University of Pittsburgh) to consider how best to adjust our plans in light of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and the limits it has imposed on travel and in-person gatherings. We came to the difficult decision to postpone the 29<sup>th</sup> annual meeting of AJLS, which was originally scheduled to be held at UCLA in the spring of 2021.

The conference committee at UCLA (Torquil Duthie, Michael Emmerich, Seiji Lippit, Satoko Shimazaki, and Junko Yamazaki) has proposed to instead organize some limited online programming during this academic year that will allow members to participate remotely. The idea is that these online events might serve as a prelude to an in-person gathering at UCLA, which they are hopeful can take place during the 2021–22 academic year. The theme that the UCLA committee has decided upon is "Turning Points." While they in fact chose this theme late last year, it seems an especially appropriate choice at this juncture. More information about their plans will be forthcoming in coming weeks.

The organizers of subsequent annual conferences at Rutgers and University of Pittsburgh have agreed to delay their conferences by one year, with Rutgers in 2022–23 and University of Pittsburgh in 2023–24.

As the 2020–21 academic year begins, I hope you will take a moment to renew your membership, which is easy to do using this <u>link</u>. While the delay of an in-person conference this year is disappointing, it is exciting to think about how we might continue to engage with one another online. I am also pleased to report that the publication of *PAJLS* 19 is imminent, that *PAJLS* 20 will follow closely on its heels, and that a digital archive of *PAJLS* back issues is now available online.

# **Report on 28<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting at Emory**

The 28th annual conference of the Association for Japanese Literary Studies was held at Emory University in Atlanta, GA on January 24–25, 2020 at the Emory Conference Center Hotel. The theme was "Inclusivity and Exclusivity in Japanese Literature" and the conference was sponsored by Emory University Conference Center Subvention Fund, Emory University Russian and East Asian Studies Department, and the Emory University East Asian Studies Program.

There were 49 papers presented on 13 panels. Participants came from near and far, including Brazil, India, and Japan in addition to the United States and Canada. Professor Robin LeBlanc of Washington and Lee University gave a thought-provoking keynote address entitled "Thinking About Japan Studies from the Perspective of a Scholar of Medium Privilege." On the second day, Professor Christina Laffin of University of British Columbia facilitated a wide-ranging plenary meeting that encouraged participants to reflect on the theme of "inclusivity and exclusivity" in relation to scholarly practice.

Thanks to the careful planning of conference organizer, Professor Cheryl Crowley, and the assistance of Yukari Shinagawa, the conference was a great success.
