AJLS 31st Annual Meeting Genres and Genre Theories in Japanese Literature May 10–11, 2024, Yale University

Call for Papers

From *waka* poetry to the I-novel, from war tales to historical fiction, from diaries to essays, Japanese literature abounds in genres. Scholarship on genres has thrived too, with many excellent studies covering both classic and modern genres. Some studies examine the theme, form, and material format of individual genres, others focus on the reception, social life, or ideological implications of genres. Yet there are aspects of established genres that remain underexplored or emerging genres in need of more scholarly attention. Building on the already thriving scholarship on genre, we can revisit basic questions about genre or explore new theoretical frameworks for understanding genre and Japanese literature. Scholars working in any period or on any kind of literary materials (broadly understood) are invited to submit papers. Themes that panels and papers may address include, but are not limited to, the following:

- What makes a genre?
- Who makes a genre? Is it writers, readers, or perhaps editors and publishers?
- What does the Japanese context add to existing theories on genre?
- What are the terms used for "genre" and literary categories in Japanese scholarship?
- Writers and artists and their views on the conventions and constraints of genre.
- The lives of global genres in Japan vs. Japanese local genres and their international reception.
- Minor genres such as *miraiki*, *keizai shōsetsu*, literary biographies etc.
- New genres such as web shōsetsu and isekai.
- Sinitic genres.
- Relation between genre and medium (periodicals, internet platforms etc.).
- Genre and various performance traditions.
- Popular genres and adaptations into film, television shows, or games.
- Trends in the English translation of Japanese genres.
- The pedagogy of genres.
- Genres and the distinction between highbrow and popular literature.

The deadline for submitting proposals is December 15, 2023. Individual proposals should include an abstract (250 words or less). Panel proposals should include a panel abstract (250 words or less) as well as individual panel abstracts (also 250 words or less). Both individual paper proposals and panel proposals can be submitted via the conference portal at https://ceas.yale.edu/association-japanese-literary-studies-meeting-31. Report on the 30th annual meeting of AJLS University of Pittsburgh

Hosted by Charles Exley and Elizabeth Oyler, University of Pittsburgh, with the cooperation of Christopher Lowy and Yoshihiro Yasuhara, Carnegie Mellon University, the 30th annual meeting of AJLS took place at the University of Pittsburgh, May 12–14, 2023.

Thirty-four papers were presented engaging with the conference theme: "In step/out of step: performance/culture/location/dislocation." The conference featured a presentation by Itō Hiromi and Jeffrey Angles titled "Pulling the Thorns of Suffering," and a keynote address by Hideo Tsuboi entitled "Playing St. Sebastian: A Queer Reading of and Between Literary and Visual Texts from the Modern Period."



Digital Archive for PAJLS

The complete contents of *PAJLS*, more than 450 articles in 20 printed volumes, has been digitized and made available online. Brandeis University Library has agreed to host the digital files in perpetuity as part of its institutional repository. The articles can be freely browsed or downloaded. More than one hundred articles from the five published volumes of the predecessor of *PAJLS*, *PMAJLS* (Proceedings of the Midwest Association for Japanese Literary Studies), are included as well.
